Scam Alert

Dear UUFB members and friends,

Recently several members of UUFB report getting email requests that claim to be from me 'Rev. Threet' but are actually a scam. They include a 747 area code number number (which is NOT mine), they are asking the recipient to purchase emergency gift cards 'for cancer patients', and they promise that somehow you'll be repaid later. THESE ARE A SCAM! I will never request that anyone purchase gift cards in this way. I use only one email address, which you are all familiar with, and

the only phone number I have is the one in our directory. Please ignore any such requests: they are NOT legitimate! Whatever gift cards are offered just enrich the scammer.

Unfortunately, anyone can set up an account using anyone else's name and it's almost impossible to stop this from happening. Please do not share the information in our Directory with anyone other than our own UUFB community, since unauthorized access to an organization's mailing list allows scammers to set us schemes such as this. Posing as a clergy person in an attempt to scam that clergy's congregation is, sadly, all too common. Don't fall for it!

Citing the Koran""We need to know one another", stressed Wajih Miri, (right side of couch) as the native of Tunisia and a Muslim, spoke Saturday, Nov. 23 at the UUFB in a series of informal lectures addressing the need for unity despite national or cultural differences. Locally, he has been active in movements seeking peace for Palestinians. Not an official spokesman but an ardent public citizen, he said he is speaking where possible to groups to contribute to the "collective conscience" of all who will listen. Go the Extra Mile

To keep ourselves and each other as safe as possible during this season of heightened infections, please take recommended precautions: getting vaccines, keeping hands washed, staying home when you have any symptoms or when you may have been exposed to an infected person, using masks, testing, and isolating, following the CDC protocols. This congregation has a generally older, at-risk population who are nonetheless quite active in the community and travel all over -- and we want to stay active! So let's take reasonable precautions. Remember that our services, meetings and classes are accessible online either regularly or when requested.

Hybrid Services

Having our services on Zoom during the COVID pandemic was a community-saving innovation. When we were able to have in-person services, we expanded who we could serve by having a Zoom component to accommodate people who could not come to the meetinghouse. All of this technology was planned, organized and operated by a small team of members led by Steve Gillette. This team has put in many hours making sure that services were available online. At one time, attendance online averaged about 6; now attendance has diminished to one or none. As a result, the tech team are proposing to end hybrid services at the end of the year. If anyone needs to stay home and would like to attend a service by Zoom, they can request an online link a few days ahead by contacting Steve. Services will continue to be recorded and put on our website as they are currently. More details will follow later.
